A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

"But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you." - Luke 6:27-28 (NRSV)

Last month, I began writing about the three General Rules for righteous Christian living which Methodism's founder, John Wesley, put into place to guide the small groups of Christians he was shepherding in the Methodist movement in 1700s. January's focus was on the first Rule: "Do no harm." This month, we turn our gaze to the second Rule: "Do good."

"By doing good; by being in every kind merciful after their power; as they have opportunity, doing good of every possible sort, and, as far as possible, to all." – John Wesley, as quoted in 2016 Book of Discipline, ¶104.

"Do good." This Rule is fairly simple to understand. We should endeavor to always act in ways showing love and respect for the other, just as we would have the other treat us. In every circumstance, I attempt to choose the path of doing good. Note that this is a more proactive stance than that required for the first Rule, "do no harm." For in order to "do good," I must boldly commit to seeking good in every situation, and take action on that do-gooder impulse.

The tricky part is that both our biblical text and John Wesley are clear that doing good extends to everyone, no exceptions. This means that I am commanded to "do good" even to those who I would rather avoid, those who mean to do me harm, those who reject my good intentions and actions, and those who are my enemies. Here is where John Wesley himself acknowledged struggle to conform. He reflected in his Journal that doing good to an enemy required having "the image of God fresh stamped on the heart; an entire renewal of the mind in temper and thought, after the likeness of [God]...." In order to achieve this oneness with God, we especially need to practice the third General Rule, which we will learn more about next month.

We live in a culture that directly contradicts the command to "do good" to anyone other than ourselves. Living a "do good" way means putting oneself in opposition to the ways of the world; this is our Christian challenge. Swinging to an extreme, there is danger in taking the injunction to "do good" too far. There is a difference between healthy sacrifice for others and unhealthy self-denial. What are the boundaries of "doing good?" This is why being part of a group that holds one another accountable is so important. Remembering that we are each created as God's beloved is important. We can only truly follow these General Rules when starting from deep knowledge of our belovedness in the eyes of God.

As I write this, we are but a few days away from the beginning of Lent on February 14th, which traditionally is a time of repentant introspection and a renewed focus on righteous living in the life of Jesus followers. Perhaps reflecting and practicing Wesley's General Rules can be a part of your spiritual practice during the upcoming season of Lent. I pray that each of us, with the support of the congregation, can strive to "do good!"

FOOD PANTRY AND WEAVERS

Outreach All are Welcome Here. The Pantry provides food to residents of the Red Hook School District regardless of citizenship or immigration status. We are not a government agency. We do not collect nor share information about immigration status. We protect your personal information and do not share.

The Food Pantry is having a meeting on Thursday, February 1st, 6 pm at the church. This is an open meeting, anyone is welcome. The Food Pantry is looking for a name! As we grow out into the community, we would also like to evolve a name to reflect that. We will still have the same goals of feeding the Red Hook Community, but we would like to grow more community involvement. How about "Feed the Need Food Pantry", or "Hand to Mouth Food Pantry" or "Community Cares Food Pantry"? Have an idea? Let us know!

I am happy to report that in 2017 our Food Pantry served 4,619 individuals. This breaks down to; 1,058 children, 651 seniors, and 2,924 adults that make up 1,581 families in our community. The totals for December 2017 alone were 455 individuals, comprised of 104 children, 55 seniors, and 296 adults or 148 families in our community.


